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Ignacio Grossmann's 65th Birthday Celebration Sessions, Atlanta AIChE Meeting

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On Monday November 17th, two CAST-sponsored sessions [136, 192] were organised by Chris Floudas and Stratos Pistikopoulos in honor of Ignacio Grossmann's 65th Birthday – to recognize Ignacio's seminal contributions, lasting impact and unique career in process systems engineering. The sessions were a follow-up to a very nice celebration dinner that was held on Sunday evening, November 16th attended by Ignacio's wife Blanca and over seventy, overenthusiastic friends, colleagues and former PhD students and associates (see photos). It was quite a gathering at which amongst other events and happenings, Ignacio was presented with a poster featuring his impressive, strong and growing Academic Tree – numbering over 350 members (see Figure attached).



The two afternoon sessions in a fully packed room involved presentations, with contributions from Ignacio's close academic colleagues, associates and members of his Academic Tree. After a brief introduction by Chris Floudas, setting the tone and background for the event, Rex Reklaitis gave an impressive account on 'Process systems engineering advances supporting development and manufacture pharmaceuticals' - clearly demonstrating

the far reaching role that multi-scale modelling, process and product design, and intelligent manufacturing have been playing in this important sector. This was then followed by three contributions from former PhD students of Ignacio's, Ross Swaney, Stratos Pistikopoulos and Nick Sahinidis, who tried hard to impress their former supervisor with their recent and ongoing research contributions, from 'field theories' to 'multi-parametric programming' to 'black-box model-based mixed-integer nonlinear programming' (presentations attached). The last presentation of the first session was an elegant contribution by Pedro Castro on a subject that Ignacio himself pioneered and championed: how 'generalized disjunctive programming' can bring out creativity in model development – transforming the 'art' into 'science' (presentation attached). The second session started equally impressive with Manfred Morari on 'Mixed Logic Dynamical Systems', who provided a guided tour of the power of this modelling, optimization and control paradigm coupling mixed integer modelling & optimization within model predictive control, creating unparalleled opportunities in a wide range of application areas from automotive to power systems. This was followed by three more contributions from Ignacio's former PhD students, with Chris Floudas on 'global optimization', Christos Maravelias on 'scheduling' and Metin Turkay on 'multiobjective optimization' (presentations attached). Marianthi lerapetritou, one of Ignacio academic grand-daughters, gave an excellent overview presentation on everything one would like to know about 'process flexibility' - and arguably much more. They all provided ample evidence of Ignacio's Academic Tree influence and impact on the field across the globe.

The session finally ended with Ignacio himself – this was indeed the highlight of the full event, the moment everyone was waiting for. And it was equally rewarding, as Ignacio's class act touched us all with his 'Reflections on 35 years in process systems engineering research' – see attached. The 'Lessons Learned' that he shared with us in particular should serve as a standard reference for anyone who wants to embark on academic adventures and beyond. Ignacio, of course did reassure us all that this is only an 'interim



report', and that he intends to continue in full-speed, even accelerating!
